FEDERAL MATTERS

President Biden signed the Respect for Marriage Act into law. Thousands of LGBTQ+ people, families, and allies, including PFLAG families and PFLAG National staff, attended the signing ceremony for the bill, which will protect same-sex and interracial marriages at the federal level.

STATE MATTERS

Illinois - Attorney General writes letter urging enforcement of anti-discrimination protections. Attorney General Kwame Raoul wrote that many public officials in the state are concerned about safety at LGBTQ+ -themed public events, but that the Illinois Human Rights Act requires that LGBTQ+ people have their right to safely access public spaces protected.

GLOBAL MATTERS

Netherlands - <u>Dutch Constitution amended to protect</u> <u>LGBTQ+, disability rights.</u>

MEDIA MATTERS

Oxford English Dictionary adds LGBTQ+ related words.

Eighteen LGBTQ+ related words were added to the dictionary in 2022, including "gender-affirming," and "enby."

<u>"woman."</u> The dictionary defines "woman" as "an adult female human" or "an adult who lives and identifies as female though they may have been said to have a different sex at birth."

Queer writers launch powerful, positive books in 2023 amid ban efforts. Stay tuned for robust offerings that follow a record-setting number of titles in 2022.

PFLAG provides the opportunity to dialogue about sexual orientation, gender identity and gender expression, and acts to create a society that is healthy and respectful of human diversity.

To make our meetings more comfortable and secure place for everyone, what is said here stays here. Confidentiality is important to all of us for one reason or another and we must respect each other's rights at all times.

We earnestly welcome new members and encourage everyone to attend as many meetings as possible for the benefit of each individual as well as that of the group, because it is when you no longer feel the need for PFLAG that PFLAG needs you the most.

Fighting the Hate in Our Communities



Turning Tragedy into Advocacy

On November 19, 2022, late Saturday evening, a 22-year-old gunman opened fire in a gay nightclub, Club Q in Colorado Springs, killing five people and leaving more than two dozen injured before he was subdued by heroic patrons and arrested by police who were on the scene within minutes.

It is a scene both horrifying and sadly, becoming increasingly more familiar, as we witness mass shootings targeting the LGBTQ+ community. In a cruel twist of fate, the shooting came during Transgender Awareness Week and hours before Sunday's International Transgender Day of Remembrance, when events around the world are held to mourn and remember transgender people lost to violence.

The Colorado Springs PFLAG Chapter recently invited Club Q's co-owner as well as a bartender / survivor to speak at their January monthly meeting. Club Q and its owners are well known to our Colorado Springs peers. The club is a safe haven for LBGTQ+ citizens, a welcoming and affirming space, a place of celebration and family.

This powerful conversation centered around the aftermath of the shooting, how people in the community are doing and what is happening in response. Here are the highlights:

A co-owner of Club Q and two survivors, one of whom was a bartender, testified on Capitol Hill on Wednesday, December 14th about the tragedy that night and the rise of hate aimed at their community. Less than a month after the shooting, the 25-year-old Bartender found himself facing Congressional members of the House Oversight and Reform Committee.

The three individuals were all at the White House for the signing of the Respect for Marriage Act which codifies federal protections for same-sex and interracial marriage.

While at the White House, they were invited to a short private meeting with President Biden and Dr. Jill Biden who acknowledged their courage and advocacy efforts.

In a show of solidarity, the owners plan to rebuild, strengthen and reopen Club Q later this year. They plan to showcase the strength, resilience, and pride of the LGBTQ+ community by speaking out, advocating against hate with love and passion to fight for change.

INTERVIEW

Open Doors: You are an artist, photographer, designer, and you use different media and styles. What triggers changes in your creative approach? Do you work on a series of similar works before switching to something new or do you constantly alternate between different projects?

Daniel Eggert: I love experimenting with different media in my work. I wouldn't say there is really any certain thing that might trigger a change in what I am doing. I believe it relies on inspiration and what ideas I may have. I tend to think of concepts/ideas and then decide what I think the best medium would be to use to create the piece. I might get inspired by other artists from social media and want to

try a certain technique that they use but it may not become something that I end up using often. When I find something that works for me and I like doing, it then becomes something that I might use all of the time. I am constantly looking to enhance and build up my skills and techniques that I use on each of my pieces.

OD: Art may deliver a political statement, entertainment, education; it may shock, inspire, anger, fill with love or cause any other emotion. What effect do you want your artworks to have in the world?

DE: I am very passionate about creating work that has a deeper meaning than just being pretty. A lot of my work is definitely within the LGBTQ+ community and telling my story as a gay man. I am also a huge advocate for mental health and making sure that it is a subject that isn't taboo

to talk about. I want people to share their experiences so that we all can learn and possibly relate to each other on a deeper level. Don't get me wrong, there is nothing wrong with creating work that is in fact just beautiful and is more about color, composition, space, relationships between elements, etc. I do have some work that is more in that realm but I think I tend to be more passionate about work that has something to say. I also love to use my art as a way for me to respond to things that are happening in current events. Whether that be to my community directly or happening to people that I love and I am able to share my opinion and show support for the people close to me.

OD: Does Chicago provide a good environment for a creative LGBTQ+ person?

DE: I have been an artist in one way or another most of my life but I have only recently been making it my full-time gig. Because of this, I am only scratching the surface with what all Chicago has to offer. I have already been invited to display my work at the Center on Halsted on the 2nd floor that will be up until Jan. 26th, 2023. So, I feel fortunate to have the ability to already display my work within the queer spaces. One of the big things that I think artists struggle with is exposure, and the ability to afford a studio space/supplies to create the work they want to. So I hope

that those are things I can work my way towards soon. But overall, I have felt nothing but support from people who have seen my work.

OD: What are you favorite subjects in photography?

DE: People! I strive to create photographs that show the human experience. Sometimes, the shot tells this sort of story without needing any major tweaks from me, but I especially love to add a touch of surrealism, via some photoshop magic. These magical moments help me actually see the feelings that otherwise just exist in my mind's eye, and hopefully inspiring others along the way!

OD: Could you share the concept of the series of works that you created in the wake of the Supreme Court overturning Roe v. Wade?

DE: I will never be able to fully understand the hurt, pain, and anger that my friends and family members who ovulate are feeling. However, like a majority of Americans, I am here to support in any way that I can in the wake of SCOTUS overturning Roe v. Wade. It is unthinkable that people have lost the ability to make personal health decisions, and that certain politicians are continuing their attacks on the rights of marginalized Americans.

With political issues such as this, I prefer leveraging my camera and paintbrush to a microphone to express my thoughts and fight for change. This series is a statement in

support of the people in my life who should have the right to choose. Government has no business in the healthcare system making decisions that do not concern them.

Through pixel sorting and photo manipulation, these photos depict the individual identities of these women being erased so that they are no longer identifiable. Their voices are being taken away. I have also incorporated an aspect of the color red in every piece. This is to represent the feeling of anger, death, blood, etc. Some images are more distorted than others to portray the severity of what some women go through.


OD: Is it possible to teach creativity?

DE: Absolutely! There are abstract and concrete ways to hone your artistic skills with thought exercises, classes, practice, feedback, etc. Even the most seasoned artist is always growing – both technically and creatively – and to assert that they're not able to share the wealth is incongruous with my artistic philosophy. Art was meant to be seen and shared; art begets art! The more I am able to experiment and think outside of the box, the more I feel like I am able to grow artistically. I always encourage fellow artists to apply this same sort of mindset when they are looking to branch out further, or if they're at an impasse.






PRIDE FILM FEST AWARD WINNING **MID-LENGTH FILMS** streams February 1 to 12.




