### CHICAGO PRIDE PARADE



Warning: While some of the following stories describe legislative actions to celebrate and affirm LGBTQ+ people, many cover legislation targeting the LGBTQ+ community, particularly trans and non-binary youth. Please be kind to yourself and use your discretion while reading this section.

#### **FEDERAL MATTERS**

DHS warns of danger to LGBTQ+ community. The Department of Homeland Security released a document to government agencies and law enforcement stating that extremists have increased the level of threats and violence towards the LGBTQ+ community in the last year.

#### **STATE MATTERS**

**Florida** - <u>Teacher under investigation after showing movie</u> with openly <u>LGBTQ+ character</u>. Jenna Barbee showed her fifth graders "Strange World," a PG-rated Disney film and was accused of indoctrinating and "stripping the innocence" of students.

**Florida - Gov. DeSantis signs slate of anti-LGBTQ+ bills on May 17<sup>th</sup>.** On the International Day against Homophobia,
Biphobia, and Transphobia, the Governor signed bills into law
affecting medically necessary care, classroom censorship,
bathroom access, and drag performances. That followed the **right to discriminate bill** he signed on May 11<sup>th</sup>.

■ Illinois - Bills to protect LGBTQ+ rights sent to Governor. The legislation changes the language in state child-care law to be more inclusive, mandates tracking non-binary and gender non-conforming employees in state agencies to improve employee diversity, and makes it easier for LGBTQ+ couples from other states to marry in Illinois.

Montana - State becomes first to ban drag performers from reading to children in schools and libraries. HB 359 bars any event "hosted by a drag queen or drag king who reads children's books and engages in other learning activities with minor children present."

Massachusetts - LGBTQ+ youth program helps teens from unaccepting environments. The program is called Summer of Sass and seeks to help LGBTQ+ 18- to 20-year-olds get space from the harassment they may face back home in less accepting areas of the country. **Nebraska - Governor signs abortion restriction, gender- affirming care ban.** On May 22nd, Governor Jim Pillen signed Legislative Bill 574 which limits abortion access to the first 12 weeks of pregnancy and bars trans people under 19 from accessing medically necessary care.

**Indiana - Forced outing legislation approved.** Signed by Governor Eric Holcomb on May 4th, House Bill 1608 mandates schools to inform a student's parents if they request a name or pronoun change. The bill also prohibits sex education from pre-K through third grade.

Pennsylvania - State House of Reps. passes non-discrimination bill. House Bill 300, which was approved by the House on May 2nd would make it illegal to discriminate against LGBTQ+ people in areas such as public services, housing, and employment. The law also adds sexual orientation and gender identity as categories under the purview of the state Human Rights Commission which investigates discrimination claims.

**Oklahoma - Governor signs bill banning gender-affirming care for youth.** Senate Bill 613, which prohibits best practice medically necessary care for Oklahomans until the age of 18 was signed by Governor Stitt on May 1st.

Montana - Governor signs youth gender affirming care ban.
Signed on April 28th, Senate Bill 99 blocks transgender and nonbinary minors from receiving medically necessary care including hormone replacement therapy and puberty blockers.

#### **GLOBAL MATTERS**

Cuba - Cubans celebrate legalization of same-sex marriage. Hundreds of LBGTQ+ Cubans and their allies marched through Havana on May 13th to mark the adoption of same-sex marriage.

#### **MEDIA MATTERS**

Trans youth prom held in nation's capital. The event on May 22nd, conceived by the youth, was a celebration of the community's strength and love in the face of increasing adversity.

Out of the Closet Charities collects donations of new & gently used clothing, shoes, accessories, etc. for transgender, non-binary, and gender non-conforming individuals from 8 to 80+, and then hosts monthly "Pop-up" closet sales ..... where everything is FREE! Having heard about them from a fellow member, I messaged Vikai about making a clothing donation and she quickly responded in the affirmative. She drove over to my house a few days later to pick it up and, after filling up the back of her car, we had a wonderful talk. The group also has a few drop off boxes located around the suburbs for smaller (not car-full) donations. There was so much lively, active discussions and dialogue flowing throughout the evening, we hated to have to call it a night. As a Board, we left that evening with a feeling of excitement & hope for the future with our group. And the next morning, still on that high, board member cell phones were lighting up with "wasn't that a great meeting last night" messages. We are hopeful that future meetings will continue to be as interactive, helpful, and entertaining.

Knowing that not all interested parties can regularly attend face to face meetings, we are going to try alternating in person meetings with virtual meetings, so our June meeting will be via Zoom. Our PFLAG speaker for Sunday, May 7 was Jeff Wood, a retired educator and a member of Equality Downers Grove. He presented his Emotional Management workshop. Jeff's background in education was in guidance and counseling. His workshop is an interactive experience that includes exercises related to our feelings and interacting with others.

We completed a brief group exercise where Jeff gave us parameters on how to interact; for example, some moved around while we talked while others remained seated, and some offered a handshake during introductions while others did not. Once we finished, we examined our emotions. Jeff asked us, is the event responsible for how we are feeling? You need to factor in what people say to you, and your own feelings, backgrounds, and beliefs. Negative actions or words by others can make you a victim. Thinking rationally puts you in control. How does this relate to PFLAG? You may ask yourself, Why me? Why am I facing this challenge (of having a LGBTQ child, for example.) By performing these self-help exercises, or meditations if you wish, you can begin to move away from irrational emotions for your peace of mind. You can have a better, richer life by remembering that everyone has gifts to give. You may not be able to control the adversities in life, but you can control your beliefs and the behavioral choices you make because of them.

Our next meeting is Sunday, June 4, 2023. Our guest speaker will be Calla Roulds, a Chicago police officer and a member of the LGBTQIA+ community.



We are loving meeting back in person now, although we still offer a zoom alternative. This month, our very own Jackie Perry offered A.L.I.C.E. training to our group, active shooter preparedness. She had taken PFLAG National's four-hour course and condensed it for our meeting. We thought it would be apropos as we do meet in a synagogue and we are PFLAG: two good reasons. Needless to say, our eyes were opened with the wealth of knowledge that Jackie brought. For those of you who don't know, this training is in case we are met with an active shooter, wherever we are. A.L.I.C.E. is an acronym for Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate. These are not linear directions, but ones we can adapt to the situation, our own personal choice, when the situation arises.

While businesses are the #1 choice of shooters due to their accessibility, government offices, Houses of worship, are also of choice. Schools, of course, much more emotional are about 24% of choice. We must participate in our own survival; we are our own first responders!

The DOJ, FBI, DHHS, FEMA and the Dept. of Education all got together to outline what is best for people in this situation: Evacuate, Barricade, Incapacitate (last resort).

ALERT: We must maintain our situational awareness, know where we are; what do we hear, see, smell? Recognize the situation and do something! (don't be on your cell phone). Accept what's going on and respond; create a distraction, which will confuse shooter.

LOCKDOWN: Barricade; protect self and environment around us; windows-cover them if possible; know if doors open in or out; furniture, move...delay or deny shooter access to change their thought process.

INFORM: Call 911: give as much information to dispatcher as you can. If you know what shooter is wearing, describe it. Tell where you are, what floor you're on. NOT a good idea to pull Fire Alarm or announce on PA system. Do not used codes, as most people won't know what they are.

COUNTER: Shooters advantage is his tunnel vision. If we can disrupt his thought process..throw something at him, swarm him, grab arm or leg; spread out, take him down.

EVACUATE: Know the exit points; where are all the exit doors; do the windows open?; how to get out.

This also goes for outdoor events; situational awareness is key! We all need to participate in our own survival.

Just as a reminder: our June meeting will be the celebration of the awarding of the Jean Paul Ohadi Scholarships given by Cynthia Drey, mother of Jean Paul. While it won't be a "regular" meeting, we will have time for conversation and celebration.



## Buffalo Grove Pride Parade 2023

Sunday, June 4th at 11 AM

Sixteen moms, dads, and grandparents showed up in our Zoom room for our May 11th meeting. As he does every month, our president, Bill Guilfoile, began by solemnly reciting the ground rules on which support groups like ours depend: Be respectful. Listen and take turns. All feelings are valid. And, "What is said in this room STAYS in this room."

These assurances are more than boilerplate, and they're more important than ever because what's at stake is the safety and wellbeing of our trans kids— whether they're 4 or 40 years old.

We parents are hungry to learn, and who better to guide us than Ben Greene, a charismatic trans person enthused about sharing his wisdom? Piggybacking on PFLAG Oak Park (which hosted the speaker "live" in April & reported about it here), our group watched Greene's info-packed and entertaining Ted Talk, "Where Are You Sitting?"

(https://youtu.be/u9F8WvUSgr4), with screensharing and discussion led by board member Terry Brugger.

Greene spent his first16 years "as an ugly and uncomfortable girl," and came out to a secret online support group years before daring to open up to friends and family. Now he "walks in the light" and hopes to inspire others to do the same.

His key tips for allies:


- There are many ways to be trans (whichever "chair" on the spectrum feels right)
- Think before you ask an intimate question. ("Could someone ask you about your genitals? If you've had any surgeries recently?")
- Listen to trans people.
- It's okay to admit you don't know something.
- If you're wondering how best to support someone, ask them.
- Don't stop learning.

Greene closed with striking observation: "When I first came out, I was a trans person who happened to be Ben. As I grew to be more comfortable in myself, I became Ben who

happens to be a trans person. I am a million things before I am trans, and that's okay." Amen.

On June 8th, in honor of Pride Month, we look forward to meeting in person at the Center on Halsted—and online, via Zoom+Owl—from 7 to 9pm. In addition to sharing, we will set aside time to hand out swag and arrange logistics for those hoping to join our joyfully proud Chicago Pride Parade contingent on June 25.

At our July meeting, we will read and discuss our next Book Club selection, **Transitions of the Heart: Stories of Love, Struggle and Acceptance by Mothers of Transgender and Gender Variant Children**. This classic compilation of voices has helped demystify the trans-parenthood journey for many newly "out" parents and their families. It's like reading a support group.

The Ottawa chapter of PFLAG has, like many chapters, has focused more heavily on understanding transgender identity and issues recently. After several sessions with excellent video presentations, we had the great privilege of having several trans individuals come to present a live panel at our March meeting. Each of the three were known to us through our personal, local connections, which tells us both that more rural communities like ours do have a rainbow population, and that we are blessed to be a safe enough community and chapter for transgender individuals to share their stories with us, in person.

The panel included one trans man, one trans woman, and one nonbinary individual. We heard how each became aware of their gender identity at different times of life and in different ways. Some individuals knew they were transgender from the start; others had to wrestle through various issues of identity and orientation before discovering their truest identity. One point of commonality was that it took the discovery of trans language and role models for each of them to find their own way forward. In return, each of our guests has, in their own various ways, been intentional to be role models and supporters of younger transgender people, as none of them ever had a safe space or safe individuals with whom to share their struggles and identity until much, much later in their lives.

The stories our panelists told about first coming out, and about experiences that were impactful in that process or in their transition journeys, were powerful! One moment we were laughing with them, the next hurting with them, then deeply moved by their courage and the power of affirmation from loved ones and allies. We began to know at a gut level just how important our words, tone, and actions are as allies.

In these times of aggressive anti-trans activism, we need to be not only better informed but also personally transformed, so we can be bold, humble ally-activists. We work for the day that stories like those we heard, of struggle and fear and loss, no longer repeat for the next generation of our beautiful transgender siblings and children. Next step: our presence at the **second annual Ottawa Family Pride Fest, June 10!** 

### Out of the Closet Charity



"Out of the Closet Charity" collects donations of clothing, accessories, and beauty products for individuals from ages 8-80. It hosts monthly pop-up closets throughout the suburbs and the city of Chicago for transgender/non-binary/gender nonconforming individuals to **shop for free**.

They're looking for donations of men's, women's, and teen's clothing, wigs, shoes, bags, wallets, and backpacks, jewelry, binders, hair accessories and styling equipment, undergarments, packers, new make-up and make-up brushes, new beauty, and hygiene products.


# CHICAGO PRIDE PARADE 2050

There was now an unmistakable hope — optimism that things would continue moving toward greater inclusion and understanding among all people.

It may have been different from years gone by. However, it certainly felt like something worth celebrating nonetheless - proof positive that even through tough times, we could still find moments of joyousness within



our lives, embracing who we are without fear or judgment from anyone else. That's why Pride Parades will forever remain an important event across our communities worldwide, as a celebration of freedom regardless of gender identity or sexual orientation!




